East Don River behind Clarinda Drive Erosion Control and Slope Stabilization Project

Toronto and Region Conservation Authority (TRCA) has initiated a study to address erosion and slope instability issues in the valley behind Clarinda Drive, in the City of Toronto. The study area is located in Blue Ridge Park near Sheppard Avenue East and Leslie Street. The purpose of this proposed project is to protect life and property from the hazards of erosion and slope instability.

TRCA is pleased to invite you to attend a Community Liaison Committee (CLC) meeting to discuss a range of preliminary conceptual alternatives which may be considered for this project. Stanley Chui, the owner of Sea-Hi Famous Chinese Chop Suey Restaurant at 3645 Bathurst Street, will close his business on March 8 after nearly 60 years.

SEA-HI RESTAURANT CLOSING AFTER 59 YEARS

LEASE DIDN'T GET RENEWED, SITE WILL BECOME A DOLLARAMA

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An iconic Chinese restaurant will be closing its doors after 59 years in North York's Bathurst Street and Wilson Avenue area.

Sea-Hi Famous Chinese Chop Suey Restaurant was originally set to close Feb. 29 but due to an outpouring of support from the community, it has negotiated an extension to its lease — allowing it to remain open until March 8.

"These couple of weeks were crazy. Everybody is coming, and that was quite a surprise but I was so touched," said owner Stanley Chui. "They want to have a last meal (here) or to say farewell."

Chui, 69, said his relative Edna Chan opened the first Sea-Hi at Dundas and Bay streets in the old Chinatown in 1955, then opened the current location on Bathurst south of Wilson in 1961. "(Chan) trained me to run the business," said Chui, adding he took over the business 43-and-a-half years ago.

Chui said his eatery is closing because his lease didn't get renewed. The site will become a Dollarama, he said.

Though March 8 is the restaurant's last day of service, its lease officially ends March 14.

Chui said he plans to sell all the contents of the restaurant, such as tables, chairs, plates and signs, and donate the proceeds to two local hospitals: Baycrest Health Sciences and North York General.

Chui noted he might open a takeout restaurant after he closes Sea-Hi, though no plans have been made. "I have to finish this location and then see what happens."
